Commanding Officer's Message

Hello, to the Regimental Association from myself and RSM Mills. I am very pleased to contribute to this edition of the Association newsletter.

The Regiment has again been very busy since the last newsletter. The training year is in full swing. Some highlights of the past few months are as follows: The Regiment organized and trained the 36 CBG Canadian Patrol Competition team which competed in November of last year. They finished fourth nationally overall, but first nationally as a reserve team. This is also significant as they were also the only reserve team to finish high enough to earn a medal standing which resulted in a Pennant being personally delivered to them in Halifax by the Army Commander, LGen Haines, CMM, MSC, CD.



In January the Regiment organized and conducted a Joint Exercise with the Princess Louise Fusiliers and other members of the 36 CBG in Aldershot. There were 144 all ranks, and even the affiliated Cadet Corps sent cadets to be part of the civilian force. The Division Commander visited and was quite impressed with the numbers and different Units involved in the exercise.

On 12 Feb the Regiment Presented Clerisy Entertainment a Command Team Commendation and coin for their great work on a documentary called *The Citizen Soldiers* about the Regiment's battles in the Italian Campaign. It is currently showing on Eastlink "On Demand", but arrangements are being made to get DVDs for sale.

Some upcoming events: Unit Advanced Shooting weekend where the soldiers will learn to shoot from longer distances than they normally do, and our annual celebration of Italy Day is 28 May this year (details to follow). I look forward to seeing everyone at Italy Day in May and hope you have a great Spring.


WNSR Historical Videos

Here is some information on two excellent video documentaries about the West Nova Scotia Regiment during the Second World War with specific emphasis on the Italian Campaign. If you enjoy history and want to learn about the West Novas in WWII from people who were there, these are videos you'll want to see.

Last year, we were waiting for the release of "The Citizen Soldiers" made by [Clerisy Entertainment](#) and produced and directed by Dale Stevens who was our guest speaker at the 2015 banquet.

It is a locally made, professionally produced, hour long documentary on the West Novas in the Italian Campaign. West Novas who were there tell their stories about what it was like. Interviews are included from Victor Dukeshire, Burlington, ON; Hugh Cuvelier, Mahone Bay; Doug Strickland, Sydney; and Major Harry Eisenhauer, Calgary, who took the Regiment back from England in 1945.

The documentary showed first on Eastlink TV in January 2016 and is still available "On Demand" for those with Eastlink cable service. The company has just produced copies on DVD for those who were not able to see it otherwise. These will soon be available on the [Kitshop website](#) by the end of April.



In March, we were made aware of "The Boys from Nova Scotia", another locally produced documentary of the West Novas in Italy. Produced in 2004 and published on Youtube in 2016 by Mike Dobson of Lunenburg, it's very well done and runs for 43 minutes. Available at www.Youtube.com by searching for "The Boys from Nova Scotia" it has great footage and photos from WWII and features interviews with many West Novas including Art Doucette, Oren Foster, Gordon Romkey, Harold Wolfe, Bill Thexton, Carrol Pothier, Max Forsyth-Smith, Alex McGuinness, Leo O'Meara, Ralph Rafuse, and Abel LeBlanc.

Mike told me that he had DVDs made and will sell them at cost plus shipping because his goal is to tell the story of these brave men of the WNSR. Howard Medal Awarded to 2444 RCACC Cadet

The Major General Howard Award is given to the top Army Cadet in each province at the start of every training year by the Army Cadet League of Canada. The Nova Scotia recipient this year is cadet Sergeant Skyler Richardson from the 2444 Army Cadets in Kentville. To receive the Major General Howard Award, the winning cadet must have completed three years of training, be active in community volunteerism, be an excellent leader, and be one of two top cadets in the province in the fourth-year training program.



Skyler is regarded by his fellow cadets as a natural leader and is known for his devotion to the cadet program. What some may not know however is that he volunteers a lot of his spare time at his school and in his local community. He helps to maintain and groom the gardens at his school and volunteers his time to tutor students that need assistance with their studies.

He feels that volunteering his time to make his community a better place is important, "You may start things as an individual, but in the end you will always end as a team." Sgt Richardson says he lives by this motto every day. His time spent volunteering is also expanding; in the near future he plans on volunteering at the local food bank as well.

On hand to present the medal at the Corps parade at the Drill Hall in Aldershot in November was Colonel Eric Meisner, Honorary Lieutenant Colonel of the West Nova Scotia Regiment.

Nova Scotia Cadets Take Part in Epic Adventure

Kentville's Skyler Richardson and Port Williams' Jesse Clark traveled to Goose Bay, NL to take on the Regional Army Cadet Winter Expedition: EXERCISE SUB ZERO, March 19 to 26.

The two are members of 2444 Kentville Royal Canadian Army Cadets and will be keeping warm during the frigid expedition which consists of snow shoeing, pulling and pushing equipment-packed toboggans, camping out overnight and learning everything they can about winter survival.

"This is going to push us both mentally and physically," said Jesse, a Cadet Warrant Officer at the Corps. "I think the biggest challenge is dealing with a dry cold instead of a wet cold... Preparing myself mentally is going to be the hardest part."

EXERCISE SUB ZERO takes place every year in Happy Valley-Goose Bay. Youth are selected from across Atlantic Canada and represent some of the region's best army cadets. Cadets are taught the skills and given the equipment they need to survive in the cold. They hike three days and spend two nights in the backcountry, surrounded by wilderness. They have to learn to work together quickly in order to complete the trek; teamwork and perseverance is the only effective way to get



through this expedition.



Skyler Richardson knows what it takes, "I have been working out at the gym and building myself up for the long days in the cold." The Cadet Warrant Officer had been training hard for the opportunity, but then it's not just the physical fitness aspect that will be difficult. "The hardest challenge for me will be adjusting to the cold; I never like the frigid cold!"

EXERCISE SUB ZERO is part of the larger Army Cadet Expedition Program, a premier part of Army Cadets that challenges youth to use their skills and aspire to goals. The exercise is a regional-level expedition, acting as a qualifier for those cadets looking to take on the challenge of a national-level expedition in Canada or abroad. To be selected, each army cadet must be 15 years of age, participate in at least one local area adventure training weekend, and obtain a Silver Star qualification in the Army Cadet Fitness Test.

Re-dedication of 112th Battalion Colours



After the outbreak of the First World War, authority was granted to raise an infantry battalion in the area of Windsor in November 1915. The push to raise the 112th Bn CEF was led by a Windsor lawyer and the MP for Hants at that time, Lt.Col Hadley Tremain. Within six months, the unit was at full strength, and the battalion left for England 23 July 1916. By 20 October, 374 other ranks had been sent to reinforce the 25th Bn CEF (Nova Scotia Rifles), and the remainder of the 112th Bn also served as reinforcements for other units at the Front including the Royal Canadian Regiment.

The West Nova Scotia Regiment perpetuates the 112th Battalion CEF, and that's why we will be participating in the Re-dedication of the Colours of that unit on Sunday, 12 June 2016, 100 years after the Battalion was authorized.

At 1030 hours 12 June 2012, the re-dedication Ceremony will take place in Christ Church, Windsor where the Colours of that Battalion were laid up. The Regiment will provide a "Corporal's Guard" without arms for the service. The Regiment will have representatives on hand for the service, and members of the Regimental Association are also invited to attend. Dress for RA members is RA No.1 as in the WNSRRA Constitution (Beret, Blazer, Tie, Medals). Several re-enactor groups have also been invited to attend. This is an opportunity to recognize the efforts of our predecessors who fought in World War one and earned the Battle Honours from that conflict that emblazon our own West Nova Colours. Looking forward to seeing RA members at this centennial commemorative service.



West Nova WWII Sniper Exhibit

For years, various elements of the Regiment have been discussing the possibility of having a WNSR museum; unfortunately, we don't have the resources to make this a reality. So, we've decided to put our efforts into displaying some of our photos and historical artifacts at museums that already exist. It's one way to get our story out there to educate the public about our Regiment.

Most people don't know it, but for the last year, a small group of RA members have volunteered time and energy to preserving the history of the West Novas. They've met and researched what must be done, and they've discussed the best ways to do it. Then, they sorted and catalogued a great number of Regimental photos, documents, and newspaper clippings. They've also devoted plenty of time and effort toward using uniforms and artifacts from WWII to create an excellent West Nova exhibit to display in local museums.




They've met with local museum curators and have gotten advice and information as to how to create an exhibit. Then they developed a plan to display their exhibit locally.

It has happened; we have an exhibit called, "*Sightings: Exploring the Scope of the Canadian Sniper in World War Two*" in Kentville at the [Kings County Museum](#) (KCM). The exhibit will be on display from 18 April to November 2016 focussing on the history of WNSR snipers. The plan is currently to display a similar but expanded exhibit at other Valley museums, starting with the MacDonald Museum in Middleton in the same time period (Apr-Nov) during 2017.

The picture shown at the above is of a rehearsal for the exhibit which was shown at last year's reunion. The picture to the left is a portion of the current display. The display has been significantly expanded and enhanced for the exhibit in the KCM. Army Museum Halifax Citadel

The [Army Museum](#) at the Halifax Citadel is a well maintained and frequently updated museum for the display of Canadian Army memorabilia. Since 1953, the Army Museum at the Halifax Citadel, a private, non-profit institution, has been faithfully preserving and promoting Atlantic Canada's military heritage. The items on display come from a vast collection of more than 70,000 military artifacts. It is a member of the Organization of Military Museums of Canada, operating with the assistance of the Nova Scotia Museum and Parks Canada.



Its exhibits are realistic and educational. Anyone who has an interest in the Canadian Army, especially with a Nova Scotia focus, needs to visit this museum.

Currently, there is a new exhibit on the Second World War with emphasis on Nova Scotian regiments and the contributions made by their members of various ethnic backgrounds. Two West Novas are featured in particular: Private Howard William Pelley, MM, a decorated African-Nova Scotian soldier and Lieutenant JA "Blackie" Blanchard, an Acadian officer from PEI, killed in action at Castel di Sangro.

If you're in Halifax and have a chance to visit the Halifax Citadel, don't forget to visit the excellent displays at the Army Museum and see our famous Regiment represented among the best.

Thexton Book


"Times to Remember" is a book written by a West Nova WWII veteran, Major Bill Thexton. Bill was an officer with the WNSR throughout his time in the war, and he served as a PI and Coy Comd in active combat in the Italian Campaign.

His outstanding memory comes into play when he writes this book about his experiences and those of other West Novas from 1940 to 1944. This is the true story, told by a man who was there. It's an eye witness account which tells of the successes and hardships of the soldiers of the Regiment from their years of training in England and Scotland to the years of sustained combat in Sicily, Italy, and later Holland.

After the war, Bill continued to serve in the Canadian Army until he retired to Wolfville where he worked for 20 years as Business Manager at Acadia University.

He was a faithful and active member of the Regimental Association and served as President for 10 years. Bill printed a dozen or so copies of his book for friends and family in 1996.

The WNSR Regimental Association feels that this book needs wider distribution and decided, with family permission, to reprint Bill's excellent book so that as many West Novas as possible can have their own copy. The project is underway now, and, as you can see, we're still working on designing a cover. The book will be available for purchase at the 67th Annual Reunion in Aldershot and Kentville 16-18 Sep 2016.
